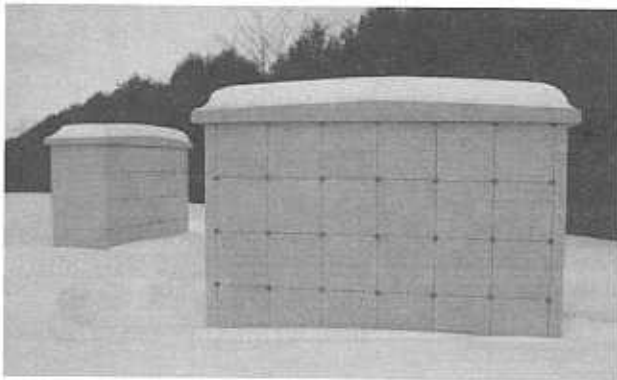

Columbaria Service Available



The Barre Town Cemetery Commission is offering a new cemetery service. Nationally, more people are choosing cremation instead of a full body burial. Already in Vermont 40% of the deceased are cremated. Barre Town Cemetery Division's experience is similar to the State average. The columbaria offers the public an alternative to buying a grave lot and grave stone. The Cemetery Commission proposed building two columbaria in the Wilson Cemetery. The columbaria are installed, the cemetery regulations have been amended, and prices have been set. The Commission is now offering this new service to the public.

Late last summer, Granite Industries of Vermont (GIV) won a competitive bid contract to build and set two columbaria, two benches, and a pedestal -- all crafted

from Barre gray granite. The project budget is \$50,000. The granite products cost \$34,450 installed. The 4' deep concrete foundations and foundations for the benches and pedestal cost \$6,150. The \$9,400 balance will be used for a walkway (possibly granite pavers) and landscaping.

GIV's subcontractor set the columbaria and other products the day before Thanksgiving. Over the summer and Fall, the Cemetery Commission was drafting and discussing cemetery regulation amendments to include columbaria. The new regulations were adopted on December 10. That night, the Commission also approved prices for columbaria niches (compartments). Barre Town residents will be charged \$1,100 for a niche; non-residents will be charged \$1,375. Each niche can hold two urns. The niche covers can be engraved in compliance with cemetery regulations.

Homestead Declarations

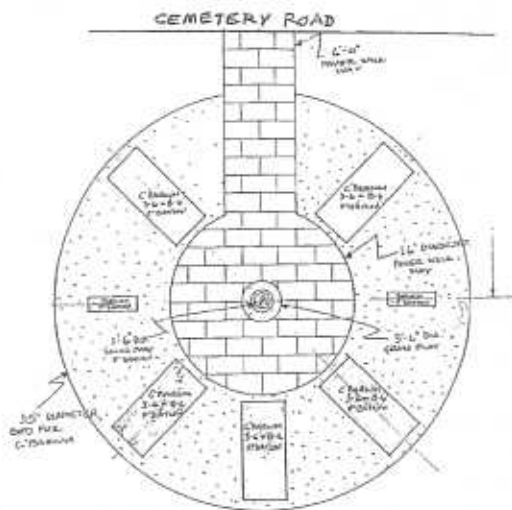
If you own property declared as your Homestead for 2009-2010, you should have received a postcard from the State of Vermont reminding you to file a Homestead Declaration (HD). If you own and occupy a property as your principal residence as of April 1, 2009, you must file an HD with the State in order to receive the lower residential tax rate.

File your HD as early as possible so the Vermont Tax Department and the Town Assessor have adequate time to review your filing to ensure it is correct. You do not need to wait until you file your taxes. You may file your HD on-line at www.tax.vermont.gov as early as January 5, 2009.

All HD's must be filed by April 15, 2009 in order to receive the lower residential tax rate. Any filings after April 15 and until September 1, 2009 will be treated as late filings and have a 1% penalty applied to the tax bill. If you file after Sept. 1, you will not receive the lower residential tax rate and have a 1% penalty applied to the higher tax rate for the change in status from non-residential to residential. Tax filing extensions do not apply to HD filings -- no extensions are allowed. ■

The two columbaria set last November are the first of five to be placed in a circular pattern. Space is available between this circle and the cedar hedge for four more units. Space along the walkway can accommodate four additional units.

Budget Review To Begin

Review of the proposed 2009-2010 municipal budgets began February 3rd. Working until the end of March, the Budget Committee will study every one of the 10 fund budgets prepared by the Town staff. The public is welcome to attend Budget Committee meetings held on Tuesday nights from 6:30-8:00 p.m. in the Municipal Building. The public is welcome also to inspect the budgets, as completed, at the Town Manager's Office during regular business hours (M-F, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.).

The Committee consists of the 5 Selectboard members plus 5 citizens. The Selectboard appointed 1st-year members Tom Anderson and Fred Thumm. The Town Clerk-Treasurer appointed Tracy Delude. These 3 appointees named Committee veterans Gordon Booth and Jeff Newton to fill out the 2009 Committee.

A tour of Town facilities with department heads will be offered on a Saturday in February (see article on page 2). The Committee concludes its duty by giving the Selectboard specific recommendations for each budget. Town voters have the final say over the General Fund and Highway Fund budgets. ■

Time To License Your Dog

It's that time of the year again! To better assist Town residents, the Town Clerk's Office will be renewing dog licenses by mail. If you meet the criteria below, the renewal license form was mailed the week of January 26. Vermont law requires all dogs and wolf/hybrids to be licensed annually (by April 1) in the town in which the pet resides.



How does the license by mail program work? All dog owners who licensed their pet in Barre Town in 2008 and have a current rabies certificate (one that does not expire before March 15, 2009) on file in the Clerk's Office, will receive a renewal by mail. The pet owner will verify/correct the information on the renewal, sign, detach it from the envelope at the perforation, and return it to the Town Clerk's office in the self-addressed envelope with a check or money order for the fee. Upon receipt, the Clerk's Office will validate the license, issue a tag, and return them to the pet owner by mail.

What if my dog's rabies certificate has expired? Pet owners who licensed their dog in 2008 and do not have a current rabies certificate on file in the Clerk's Office will be sent a reminder postcard informing them their pet will require a rabies shot before it can be licensed.

License Fees: Neutered/Spayed dogs - \$ 9.00
Open dogs - \$12.00

Licenses obtained after April 1 are subject to a 50% penalty. Note: Effective April 2, the base dog license fee will increase by \$1 before the 50% penalty is applied.

Have you ever wondered who will respond in a time of emergency? It so happens that the State of Vermont has a system called the Vermont Emergency Response Volunteer (VERV) registry. The VERV registry is maintained by the Vermont Department of Health, Office of Public Health Preparedness and is funded through the U.S. Department of Health, Emergency System for Advanced Registration of Volunteer Health Professionals. The purpose of VERV is to collect and coordinate local resources through a volunteer network,

Barre Town Thunder Chickens Host Safety Course



On December 6, the Barre Town Thunder Chickens Snowmobile Club hosted a safety course at the Barre Town School, certifying 39 of our younger riders. Vermont law requires anyone

born after July 1983 to attend a 6-hour course and pass a certification test in order to operate a snowmobile on the VAST trail system.

The course was taught by certified instructors David Rouleau and Mark Reaves using an instruction book, video, props, and a snowmobile provided by Granite City Cycles of South Barre. Guest speakers -- Sgt. Bret Meyer and Deputy Jim Wells, of the Washington County Sheriff's Department -- have been an integral part of the class over the years. Barre Town EMS personnel April Johns and Jake Frey addressed trailside emergencies, being prepared, hypothermia, and gave a demo of the rescue sled/toboggan. Thanks go to Fire Chief Chris Violette for having the rescue equipment on-site for use that day.

The club provided lunch (from Subway and Dominos Pizza) for the students and adults. We would like to thank Barre Town School for use of their facility, along with Dana Robinson and the other volunteers who assisted in making the class a success.

The Holden Road lawn waste site is a heavily used service. The site has been quite busy on Wednesday afternoons when 3 men monitor the site. More volunteers would help by opening the site at another time during the week.

At least 2 people should volunteer to open the site for a minimum 2-hour block of time. The lawn waste site season is from early May to late October. The starting and ending weeks can be adjusted. The volunteers are not expected to unload the organic debris. Volunteers are asked to prohibit illegal dumping and help users find the proper pile for their lawn wastes.

If you are a regular user of the site, think about volunteering. You could combine your weekly trip to the lawn waste site with a few hours of community service.

Septic System Guidelines

Many residences in the Town of Barre still rely on septic tanks and a leachfield for wastewater treatment rather than a connection to the Town sewer. Here are some helpful tips on maintaining and improving the health of the wastewater system if you are one of the property owners who has no access to the sewer.

- One of the best maintenance practices is to pump out the septic tank regularly using a septic system contractor. An experienced contractor will be able to assist in determining the health of the system and can usually detect minor problems before they become major ones. They can help with determining the size, condition, and type of tank. A tank maintenance history will also help to establish the location of the tank for transitioned or new homeowners. A system should be pumped out every 3-5 years depending on the number of persons living in the home. The greater the number using the system, the more often it needs to be pumped. Enhancement additives like Rid-X can sometimes help to bring a stale (unused) or sluggish system back in shape.
- Laundry use can affect the system dramatically. Multiple loads should be spaced out through the week rather than doing several loads back-to-back in one day.



Even though water efficient washers (12-15 gallons) use much less water than the older style (40+ gallons), there is quite an impact on the flush of water going to the tank.

- Fabric softeners are better when used in sheet form rather than liquid, and brighteners should be used that do not contain bleach.
- Garbage disposals should not be used, and most current-day designs clearly state that the system should not have them in the house.
- Grease and fat of any kind should be poured into a container and thrown out with the trash rather than down the drain.
- Harmful chemicals, cleaning solvents, paint, cigarette butts, feminine hygiene products, gun oils or solvents, latex gloves, diapers, coffee grounds, prescription medicine, kitty litter, and animal waste should not be flushed down the drain or the toilet. ■

Passport Info Update

Effective now, when you travel by air you will need a passport to re-enter the U.S. from a foreign country; if you travel by land or sea, you will need a passport or government ID (driver's license) plus a birth certificate to re-enter the U.S. As of June 1, 2009, if you travel by air, land, or sea, you will need a passport to re-enter the U.S.

The State of Vermont is also issuing an Enhanced Driver's License & Identification Card for an additional fee of \$25.00. This card meets Federal requirements and is an approved alternative document for re-entry into the U.S. Be prepared to provide ID and proof of citizenship and residency when applying for the new license.

Both the passport card and the enhanced driver's license will only be valid for land and sea travel between the U.S. and Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean region, and Bermuda.

*If purchasing *ONLY* the passport card, use the passport card fee + additional execution fee of \$25.00.

Once you apply, it will take approximately 4-6 weeks for the passport to be issued. Passport information and application forms can be obtained by calling the Town Clerk's Office at 479-9391, or visiting the U.S. Passport Agency's website at www.travel.state.gov/passport. ■

Project Updates

► **Rt. 302/110 Roundabout:** In early January (at the Selectboard's request) the Vermont Library Board, which has authority for naming State facilities, named the roundabout "The Charles Fantoni Roundabout". The honor was announced to Charlie and the public at the Selectboard meeting on February 3. Governor Douglas was present to make the announcement. Congratulations, Charlie! Construction shut down last Fall before the circular traffic pattern was formed. The contractor, J. Hutchins Construction, will return in the Spring to construct the roundabout island and traffic lanes. A metal sleeve has been laid under the intersection for a Town water line. The contractor still must push the water pipe through the sleeve. The park-and-ride along Rt. 302 is finished. The construction deadline is October 2009.

► **Water Source Development:** Last May, voters authorized borrowing of money to develop new water wells. The purpose of the new wells is supplying 100% of the Town water system's needs. Two unused wells are located on Town property; one and maybe more wells are on private property. Last summer, a water rights agreement with the property owner was signed. Phelps Engineering and it's sub-consultant completed the water source permit application and submitted it to the Vermont Water Supply Division, which published a notice of water source application. Phelps Engineering continued working on the next step: testing the existing wells. The firm learned a wetlands permit will be needed, delaying action for 2 months. In January, the Selectboard awarded a well drilling (as needed) and testing contract (\$24,000) with Chevalier Drilling. Work was beginning the last week of January. A well testing report to the Selectboard is planned for Feb. 24. Assuming testing is positive, constructing water lines to carry water from the wells to the Waterman St. storage tank could begin in Sept. 2009.

► **Hazard Mitigation/Rt. 302 & Honey Brook:** Last year, the Town received a FEMA hazard mitigation grant through VT Emergency Management. The grant was used to buy 3 properties along Rt. 302. The mitigation is removing 3 houses and a garage and creating a larger flood plain. The grant-required environmental assessment survey informed the Town where asbestos-containing material (ACM) was in the buildings. TMC Services was hired at a cost of \$12,800 to remove and properly dispose of the ACM. A contract for building removal was released for bidding, and Blue Ridge Construction of East Montpelier won the contract with a bid of \$12,245. The Barre Town DPW helped with tree and debris removal. The next and last phase is the earth work to create an expanded flood plain for the Honey

Brook. A contract will be released for bidding in late winter/early spring. The grant pays 75% of the cost.

► **Websterville & Graniteville Sidewalks:** The project built by J.P. Sicard Construction is completed. The Town has a few details to finish, including a drainage issue. The project finished under-budget because the construction contract was less than anticipated, and the scope of the project was cut when AOT decided the pavement markings (in lieu of raised sidewalk) planned in Graniteville were not adequate.

► **East Barre Sidewalk:** Last May, the Selectboard selected a preferred alternative for location of the sidewalk. A feasibility report describing the preferred project was submitted to the State. AOT rejected the feasibility report, asking for further clarification. The amended report and new project budget were completed in the Fall. The Selectboard considered submitting the report in December. The new cost estimate suggested the Town's expense would increase from \$39,000 (20% of the original project cost estimate) to \$107,000 (20% of the grant-approved budget plus 100% of the amount exceeding the grant budget). The Selectboard hesitated to accept this cost estimate. The engineers (Lamoureux & Dickinson) re-examined the project budget, cut expenses not necessary for this project, and reduced the estimated Town's share to \$39,000. Thinking the grant program requirements might greatly increase expenses, the Selectboard directed Town staff to prepare a project cost estimate assuming no grant funds. The cost, sans grant, is greater than the Town's share of a grant-funded project. On Jan. 27 the Selectboard voted to submit the report and proceed with the grant-funded project. ■
